Parking Issues outside Schools

Devon & Cornwall Police are committed to working together with other agencies as part of the Exeter Community Safety partnership in order to reduce levels of nuisance and anti-social behaviour. Our intention is to prevent this behaviour and to improve the quality of life for everyone in our community. During November and December, the Neighbourhood Police team have received reports of dangerous and inappropriate parking outside and on roads close to Stoke Hill Infants School, Stoke Hill Junior School and Willowbrook School. The reports have included vehicles stopping or being parked on double yellow lines, vehicles parked on pavements and grass verges and vehicles parked on junctions obstructing the view of other drivers and pedestrians. So far, Officers have sent advisory letters to 25 drivers who have been witnessed parking dangerously or inappropriately.

The purpose of this letter is to ask for everyone's help in this matter. If anyone has been parking in such a manner as described above, please can you ensure that you park in a safer and more appropriate place. Although we understand that parking near schools can sometimes be difficult, there are normally spaces in nearby roads. The Neighbourhood Police Team hopes that by educating drivers in the first instance, this may reduce future problems. Should these issues continue, partner agencies will look at taking further action which may include issuing further warning letters or Penalty Notices.
