

The Big Ambition Survey

<u>The Big Ambition</u> survey is open to children and young people across England, and parents and carers can fill out the survey on behalf of children. Dame Rachel de Souza, Children's Commissioner for England, wants to know what children enjoy about their schools, communities, family life, and the wider world. She also wants to find out what young people would like policymakers and Government to focus on to help them achieve their future hopes and ambitions.

The questions in the survey have been tailored to suit the age of the child answering, but, everyone is being asked what they think the Government should do to make children's lives better. The Children's Commissioner will be sharing what children tell her in The Big Ambition survey with policymakers across all the political parties to ensure they are putting children's voices and needs at the heart of their policies and priorities. The Nursery children have had a busy term, settling in and making new friends. We are very proud of how independent they are already becoming. The children have been delighting in exploring the environment both inside and outside. We were very lucky to have a visit from two doctors to tell us about their jobs which inspired the children to create their own hospital and cafe for poorly animals and dolls - it was great to see the children build on their own experience to make the play feel meaningful. Developing listening and communication is always a key focus in the Nursery and we have enjoyed listening to stories, learning rhymes and developing our vocabulary.



Year 2 are learning about toys in history and last week welcomed 2 special guests to join in with their lessons. Karen, who is one of our cleaners, and Linda, who is one of our School Administrators, came into our classrooms to talk to the children about the toys that they used to play with over 40 years ago. It was a great experience hearing about history from a primary source and the children had some super questions to ask our visitors. We were especially interested to hear about Karen's memories of being a pupil in this school when she was a child herself!

Last week in **Reception** we had an indoor 'School in the Dark' where we came in wearing our pyjamas! We talked about when we usually wear pyjamas ("in the night" and "when it's dark"). In our Vocabulary lesson, we learned the definitions of our new words 'nocturnal', 'star' and 'sunrise'. We now know that a star is "a ball of gas which glows"! We read stories based on our project 'Light and Dark', crafted stars and wands and even did some star printing. We then cosied up at the end of the day to watch a movie and drink hot chocolate.



For wond Science day, real 1 carned out the dancing mink experiment. We put milk into a dish and the added drops of food colouring. We carefully touched each drop of food colouring with liquid soap to see what happened. We noticed that when we added liquid soap, the food colouring dispersed across the plate. In Maths, Year 1 have been learning about addition and subtraction, specifically number bonds within and up to 10. The children have been using counters and tens frames to find number bonds systematically and write the number sentence. They have used their knowledge of part-part whole to find many different ways to make a number.

Should I keep my child off school?



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Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over		
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode		
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the nationa guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-1		
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hour after they started antibiotics		
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared		
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started		
Scabies	they've had their first treatment		
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics		
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
